

Graduates Issue An Encouraging Word

I don't know about you, but experiencing this spring has been especially encouraging. Once dormant plants and trees are now green and bursting open with God-given life. Psalm 95:1-7 are words of praise the Psalmist wrote as he experienced the awe of who God is by looking at what God has created. Maybe it expresses some of what you are feeling.

"Come, let us sing to the Lord! Let us shout joyfully to the Rock of our salvation. Let us come to Him with thanksgiving. Let us sing psalms of praise to Him. For the Lord is a great God, a

great King above all gods. He holds in His hands the depths of the earth and the highest mountains. The sea belongs to Him, for He made it. His hands formed the dry land, too. Come let us worship and bow down. Let us kneel before the Lord our Maker, for He is our God. And we are the people He watches over, the flock under His care." (Psalm 95:1-7 New Living Translation)

Seeing the earth green and come back to life is part of God's reminder that He's the One who gives life. He gives life to the once dormant plants and trees around us. And God gives life to people like us too even after a year that felt like we lay dormant under the cloud of COVID-19. I hope your response to the Lord is: "I will worship, bow down, and kneel before God my Maker! Because He is God and He has watched over me and kept me under His care!"

By now, most of you have heard that the Mt. Nebo Leadership Team and I have agreed that the next responsible step related to COVID is to no longer ask you to wear face masks starting Sunday, May 9th. However, if you want to continue to wear a mask you are most welcome to do so. We encourage you to be responsible for your health and do what you think is best for you. Every other row of chairs in the sanctuary will continue to be left vacant

to allow distancing during worship services. We will also resume receiving our giving to the Lord by passing offering plates on May 9th. Sunday School classes will resume June 6th. And Vacation Bible School will be offered July 27th – 30th.

Our Leadership Team has served our congregation exceptionally well during the challenges of the last several months and I want to remind you who they are and ask you to keep lifting them up to the Lord in prayer: Linda Henry, Sue Craycraft, retired Pastor Susan Davidson, Cecil Gibson, Chris Luck, Neal Massengill, Nancy Moore, and Betty Smith. Here's what led us to make these decisions. COVID infection rates, hospitalizations, and intensive care admissions continue to drop significantly. A high percentage of eligible people in the US have received at least one dose of the COVID vaccine and have some level of protection. Brown County statistics reported on the Center for Disease Control website for April 26, 2021, are: 57.1% of people in Brown County age 65 and older are fully vaccinated. And 25.8% of people 18 and older fully vaccinated. Vaccines are now readily available to Ohioans and the majority of people in Ohio who want to receive the vaccine will have received it and therefore be protected in May and early June.





details.



We have made ministry decisions about worship services, discipleship, and outreach applying recommended protocols the best that we could throughout this past year. Now seems to be the time God would have us to increase opportunities we offer people to connect more in-person for worship, for spiritual growth, for fellowship, and for outreach ministries. The isolation experienced from COVID is now a greater concern than the virus. However, we will continue to offer some alternatives to in-person during this transition. Sunday Drive-in worship offered through an FM transmitter will continue to be offered. We will continue to offer worship on-line through our website and YouTube available Sunday afternoons. And some Bible Study classes will continue to be offered virtually via ZOOM.

You may have wondered how Mt. Nebo has done financially through 2020 and the early part of 2021. As you may expect, our ministry programing expenses were lower during that period of time. Utilities expenses were slightly lower. We have also worked to cut other expenses which in part has involved renegotiating some service contracts. We did take the opportunity when we were not inside the building to have significant drywall repair and painting work completed. All our buildings were reroofed because of hail damage. That expense was covered by insurance which was clearly another way that God provided. Salary expenses remained the same because we chose to refocus staff responsibilities rather than lay them off. We wanted to care for them but we also needed additional help making personal contact with our congregation that became isolated from each other.

Overall, God has helped us maintain financially through the faithful giving of many of you. What a blessing to ministry at Mt. Nebo, but also what a great encouragement it was to me and all of us. We all witnessed our congregation worship the Lord by giving to Him even during financially uncertain times and during times when the normal way to give during Sunday worship had to change. God must certainly be pleased as more than ever we gave to Him from our hearts. I'm truly honored to be part of a congregation that works together to honor God and that works together to live out His mission for us, "To Know Christ and Make Him Known."
